Need(s) <i>(identified through assessment data, including school climate survey data)</i>			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • TTFM data reveals most incidents of bullying occur in unsupervised areas (e.g., virtual world). • TTFM data reveals an increase in moderate to severe bullying in the junior grades, a higher percentage of students not feeling safe at school and a decrease in positive teacher-student relations. • Feedback from students/teachers indicates that many students are not comfortable reporting bullying as a bystander out of fear of reprisal from bully or being seen as a “tattletale”. • Feedback from staff indicates that unstructured times have higher incidents of bullying; supervision needs to be vigilant and more structured activities need to be offered to students. • TTFM data reveals that our school has a significantly higher % of students using social media.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Kelso’s Choices (problem-solving techniques for small problems). • Common language to deal with conflict. • Community of Character Posters; character traits posted in classrooms/office. • School wide focus and explicit teaching of character traits. • Recognition of students who demonstrate exemplary character traits in monthly assemblies (certificates). • Student Council to work on safe school practices. • PALS program implemented to structure activities for the younger students at recess. • Anti-bullying websites; anti-bullying presentations will be offered to students. • Bullying Prevention Week in November recognized.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Restorative Practices and Collaborative Problem Solving used by staff. (PD opportunities for staff) • Class presentations of Kelso’s Choices by VP. • Regular contact with SRO on bullying and cyber bullying scenarios, presentations by SRO. • Posters on kids help phone, mental health crisis line, strategies on how to respond to bullying.
